<ul> <li>Abstract ideas</li> <li>Adjectives that describe you</li> <li>Beliefs you hold</li> <li>Outcomes you desire (like a certain career path or hope for society)</li> <li>Things in your life that are important to you</li> <li>Identity and background</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Concrete narratives</li> <li>Specific details that bring a theme into focus</li> <li>A vehicle for making your point (AKA an example)</li> <li>A good story illuminates your themes without you having to spell them out</li> </ul>

Themes are the things that you want the admissions officer to know about you after reading the essay. THE WHY.

The story is the way you deliver your message. THE WHAT.
